 fabric. The idea behind this is a reflective and careful examination of
 the problem would also throw up several insights which in turn
 would help address the problem.
- Recognize that the phenomenon of drop-out cannot be singularly traced to the student alone as a personal or individual problem, but one needs to identify the structural constraints in the system which force them to push out from the system. A multi-pronged long-term strategy is perhaps needed to address this problem.
- Recognize the continuity between school education and higher education in terms of issues impacting them. That's the reason we included guite a few articles from the field of school education.
- Acknowledge the fact that increasing pressure to privatize education by simultaneously questioning the relevance of public

education is something that is impacting countries the world over. Privatization may perhaps be good for society where everyone is on a level playing field, but certainly a cause for concern in countries which are stratified like ours.

- Recognize that teachers are who are at the center of any formal education are the ones facing maximum flak for the problems which lie outside of them and they have no control over. Research across the globe speaks of the need to support teachers, posit faith in them and not be constantly monitored, evaluated, micro-managed and singularly treated like an object of reform.
- Endeavour to provide you with specific strategies to address challenges that you may be facing currently in your job.
